Musicians practice every day. They take lessons. They listen to music. They work hard.

The **conductor** leads the orchestra. Conductors hold batons, or skinny sticks, and move their hands and arms to guide the musicians. Conductors help the musicians keep the beat and play their best.

The conductor chooses the music the orchestra will play. The conductor studies the music and helps the musicians understand it. The conductor sets times for the musicians to practice together before they perform in front of an audience. The conductor has to be an organized person and a good teacher.
